MEETING MINUTES**

February 4, 2026 | 3:30 - 5:00pm

1. ROLL CALL / CALL TO ORDER

Members present (in person at primary location): Sonoma County: Supervisor Chris Coursey.

Members present (remote): Marin County: (Chair) Supervisor Dennis Rodoni; Mendocino County: Supervisor Ted Williams.

The NBNCBC Oversight Committee Chair Rodoni called the meeting to order at 3:32 PM.

2. INTRODUCTIONS

Chair Rodoni facilitated introductions of attendees, summarized above.

3. PUBLIC INTRODUCTIONS

No members of the public were present.

4. CONSENT CALENDAR

a. APPROVAL OF MINUTES: August 6, 2025

Supervisor Williams moved, and Supervisor Coursey seconded approval of the Consent Calendar.

The motion passed and the consent calendar was approved.

5. GRANTS UPDATE

a. CETF Leadership Grant

- Awarded: \$125,000
- Spent to date: \$103,935
- Available remaining: \$21,065

b. CETF Local Government Best Practices Grant

- Awarded: \$50,000
- Spent to date: \$4,350
- Planned: \$8,100 for the remainder of the Studio B contract for website/newsletter
- Planned: \$32,550 for affordable internet outreach (transit advertising)
 - Supervisor Coursey asked whether advertising on the SMART train system had been considered. Mark Revis answered that it had, however the group had been concerned that its ridership demographics didn't fit the target audience. Supervisor Coursey suggested that we review the SMART train ridership data again and the group agreed to do so.
 - Supervisor Williams asked whether the advertising would be bi-lingual. Mark Revis responded that it would.
- Planned: \$5,000 to equip the new Sonoma County Library with internet facilities

b. CPUC CASF Consortia Account Funding

- Mark Revis reported that Rebekah Heinze was no longer with Sonoma EDC and she had been performing the fiscal agent tasks for the Consortium.
- Due to the current grant rules, we were unable to do much work that was reimbursable by the grant for reasons that are discussed in the next agenda item.
- For the period ending January 31, 2026:
 - Fixed Wireless Analysis is approximately 50% complete.
 - Met with ISPs Valley Internet and Comcast

7. THE CHANGING BROADBAND ENVIRONMENT – DISCUSSION/ACTION

a. CASF CONSORTIUM GRANT:

- The NBNBCB Management team met in January to discuss the changing broadband landscape and related issues involving the CASF Consortia grant. The team produced a position paper describing the situation and providing recommendations. The position paper was part of the agenda packet.
- The intent of the BEAD program was to connect every home and business in the United States to broadband. The award of the BEAD grants will mean that there will be no need for further deployment grants (barring any defaults), and that the CPUC's requirement that Consortia such as NBNBCB work on assisting ISPs to obtain CASF grants no longer fits the reality of the broadband marketplace.
- However, many people will still not be connected even though broadband



is available to them. Many cannot afford an internet connection at current prices and many do not have the computer skills to effectively and safely use the internet.

- It is the opinion of the management team that the work of the Consortium should shift toward broadband adoption activities and away from deployment.
- Because of this, the CASF Broadband Consortia grant has grown less relevant, and at the same time has become more burdensome.
- An audit by the State Controller's Office has caused the CPUC to ask for significantly more documentation and ask more questions about every request for reimbursement. This has resulted in a significant increase in the amount of time the Fiscal Agent must spend on administration of the grant.
- The time for submission of an application for the next round of Consortia grant funding is coming up. Considering how little time we are able to bill to the grant, it is the opinion of the Management team that the benefits of the grant are outweighed by its drawbacks, and we should forego applying for the next round of funding.
- Summary of the Management team's recommendations:
 - Shift the focus of the Consortium from deployment to adoption activities, advocacy, and to be a clearinghouse for broadband data developed by the four counties.
 - Forego the next round of Consortium grant funding.
 - Look for sources of digital equity funding and perform digital equity projects as funding becomes available.
 - Continue to petition the CPUC for changes to their rules to allow consortia to be reimbursed for a wider variety of activities. Particularly digital equity activities. Consider re-applying for another Consortia grant if such changes occur.
- Supervisor Williams commented that rural Mendocino residents received very little benefit from the SB156 grant programs, except for the Federal Funding Account grants received by two municipalities and a native American tribe. He recommended that we make the reasoning behind our position known to our state lawmakers.
- Supervisor Coursey asked whether any other consortia were experiencing these difficulties. Mark Revis responded that at least one other consortium, the Redwood Coast Broadband Consortium, was considering dropping the Consortia grant for similar reasons.
- Chair Rodoni called for a motion to approve the Management team's recommendations. Supervisor Coursey so moved, and Supervisor Williams seconded.

8. MANAGEMENT TEAM UPDATES

Marin County (Liza Massey):

Digital Marin Connecting Communities/Marin Housing Authority Project: Five sites, two hundred residents (seniors or people with disabilities). All residents have access to free internet (90% take rate) and free devices (59% take rate). Have set up an external help desk for the residents (not tied to the County's internal help desk). Will now focus on training and continued support.

Regional Data Sharing (Bruce Vogen): Marin and Sonoma have mapped their Broadband Serviceable Locations (BSLs), their BEAD-eligible locations and the locations that were awarded to each preliminary BEAD recipient. The footprints of the various BEAD recipients overlap multiple NBNCBC counties, presenting a need for data sharing between counties. For example, one BEAD awardee has an especially low projected cost per Broadband Serviceable Location (BSL) (much lower than the costs per BSL projected by NBNCBC's Fixed Wireless Analysis which is underway) which could potentially lead to a default. A default in one county would likely result in a default in the other counties where the ISP also received a BEAD award.

LEO Satellite Providers: Bruce Vogen reported that the two satellite providers, Amazon Kuiper and SpaceX Starlink had both requested waivers of the BEAD grant rules. Amazon requested a two-year delay in the deadline to provide service, as they do not currently have enough satellites in orbit to provide effective internet service and do not expect to for two years. Starlink requested exemptions to grant reimbursement policies.

Sonoma County (Jack Kampmann):

Regional Data Sharing: Sonoma County collaborated with Marin County on developing the data sharing arrangement. The data shared will be an internal tool to assist the four counties in monitoring the BEAD rollout. Additional data layers have been included, including demographic data. Sonoma county is hosting the shared mapping site (ArcGIS). As information is received from ISPs and the FCC about the status of their buildout, that information can be added.

Mendocino County (Tony Rakes):

CETF Leadership Grant: Mendocino has used their portion of this funding to provide laptops for public use and digital skills training at the Mendocino County Library.

Napa County (Mark Revis):

BEAD Grants: Valley Internet and Trellis Communications, two fixed wireless providers, have received preliminary awards, as have AT&T and Comcast, both providing fiber. Amazon Kuiper and SpaceX Starlink received preliminary awards for territories in rural areas that overlapped award territories for the other terrestrial awardees.

Middle-Mile Initiative: Nothing to report since the state's budget cuts eliminated most of the middle mile in Napa County.

Other Grants: Napa County received two awards from the CPUC. The first is an award for approximately \$30,000 for a project to bring free wi-fi internet access to the residents of



the Calistoga Farmworker Center. Project completion is expected to be mid-March 2026. The second is an award for approximately \$83,000 to fund digital literacy classes in partnership with Napa Valley Adult Education. The grant also funds the purchase of approximately 133 laptops to be provided to persons completing the classes.

Grant Application Assistance: Napa County assisted local community organizations in applying for approximately \$108,000 in funding for two broadband adoption grants. Napa County is also working with the Napa Valley Farmworker Foundation to apply for another broadband adoption grant in the amount of \$45,000. Napa County is actively soliciting local community organizations to apply for broadband adoption grants.

Sonoma County (Additional) (Katherine Di Pasqua): Sonoma is distributing 556 free internet subscriptions and laptops to low-income households at public housing sites throughout the county, and has plans to expand the service.

10. MISCELLANEOUS COMMENTS / QUESTIONS:

- Rich Levine asked whether NBNBCB should arrange meetings with the BEAD awardees. Mark Revis responded by asking whether that is something NBNBCB should do, or should it be left to the individual counties. Chair Rodoni suggested that the Management team should consider that question and report back.

Financial Update

- CASF Broadband Consortia Grant (\$600,000)
 - Year 1 spend: \$155,368
 - Year 2 spend: \$155,725
 - Year 3 spend to date: \$89,899 (period ends 12/31/2026)
 - \$38,626 remaining on Etheric contract.
- CETF Regional Leadership Grant (\$125,000)
 - \$21,065 unspent – allocated for Affordable Internet Outreach Project (transit ads), Sonoma Roseland Library computers, and Napa County digital equity allocation
- CETF Local Government Best Practices Grant (\$50,000)
 - \$24,781 unspent – allocated for Affordable Internet Outreach Project, Sonoma Roseland Library computers, NBNCBC newsletter (Studio B)



Upcoming Grants

- CETF Verizon-Frontier Settlement Funding
 - \$40,000,000 for digital equity
 - Will be disbursed to organizations to meet commitment of 100,000 new low-income households signing up for internet service
 - Will also fund digital literacy and digital navigator training
 - Have made grant proposals, awaiting notifications



CASF Consortia Grant Changes

AB 2279 - Amended and sent to Senate Appropriations Committee on 6/30/2026.

“(B) The standardized scope of work **shall include, but not be limited to, affordability, adoption, and community-level connectivity strategies** and infrastructure-related activities. The strategies may be locally designed to address cost, awareness, access, or other barriers to meaningful connectivity.”

“(D) The commission shall provide **an initial grant payment equal to one-quarter of the annual grant amount and quarterly grant payments shall be based on performance milestones in the scope of work and approved consortium work plan that may include activities, deliverables, or implementation benchmarks within the consortium’s reasonable control.**”

“(E) **Independently audited financial statements** for the prior fiscal year of the fiscal agent, **or equivalent financial assurances as determined by the commission.** An audit conducted for purposes of this subparagraph shall identify the costs associated with each activity funded by the grants to the consortium made pursuant to this subdivision.”



CASF Consortia Grant Changes

- Management Committee recommended shifting NBNCBC's priorities and to not apply for the next round of Consortia grant funding. OC approved at 2/4/26 meeting.
- If AB 2279 passes and the Consortia rules are broadened and administrative burden is eased, should NBNCBC apply for the next round of funding?

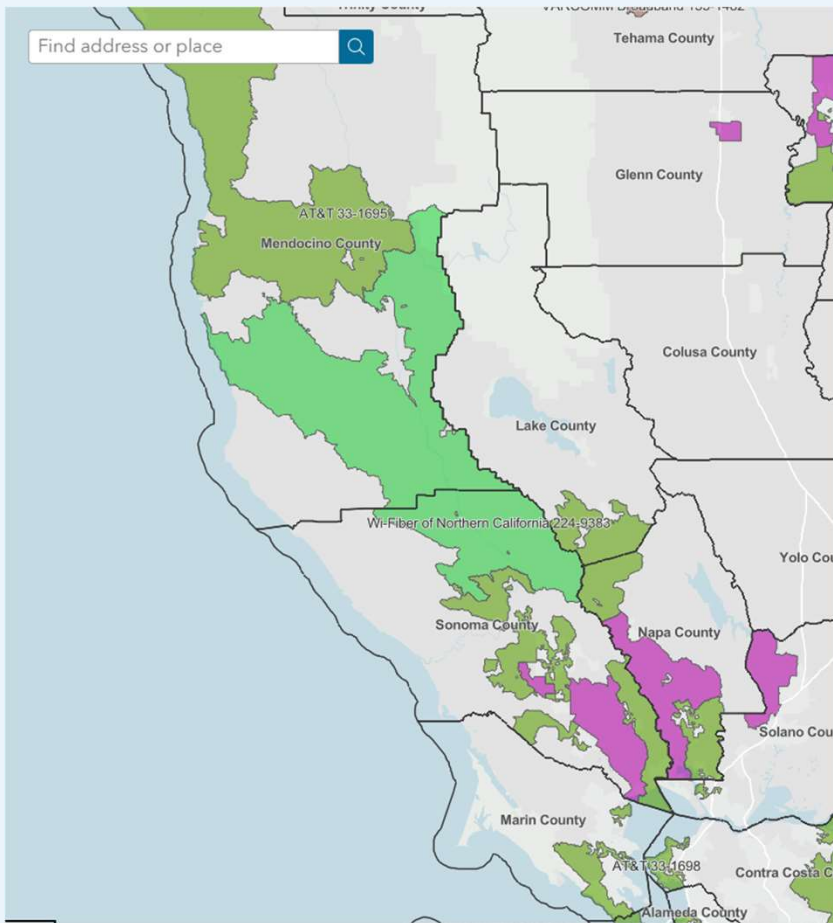


BEAD Grant Update

- California's proposal has received NTIA approval
- 8 rounds of curing
- Some changes to the original proposal; awaiting details.
- Will require CPUC resolution to accept changes (likely September)
- Once approved, next step is to negotiate contracts with awardees
- Expect permit applications to begin once ISP contracts are executed.

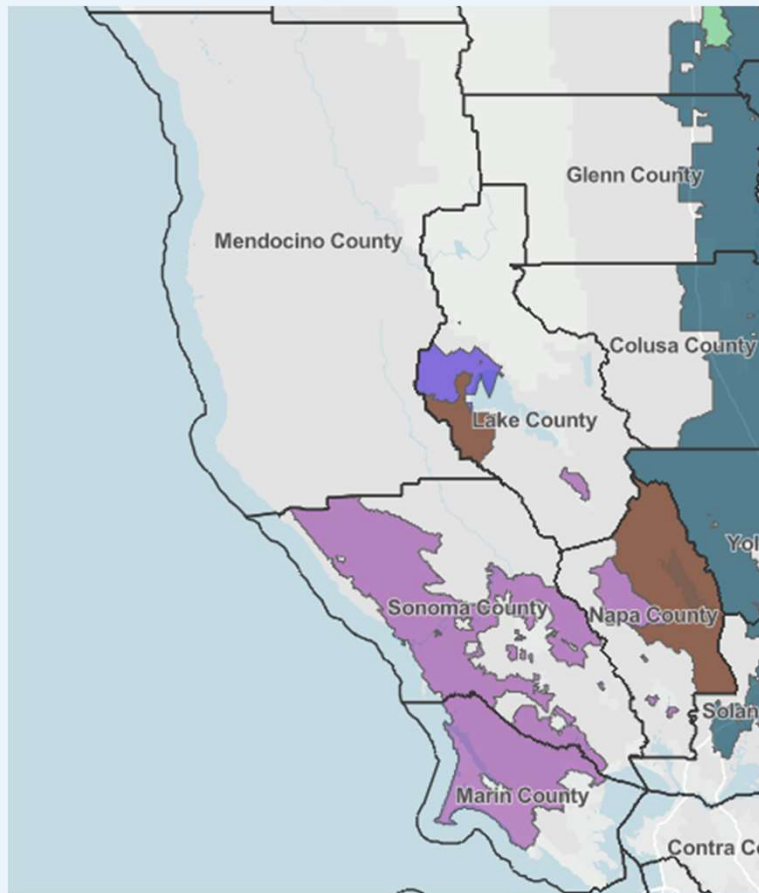


Preliminary BEAD Award Map – Fiber Projects



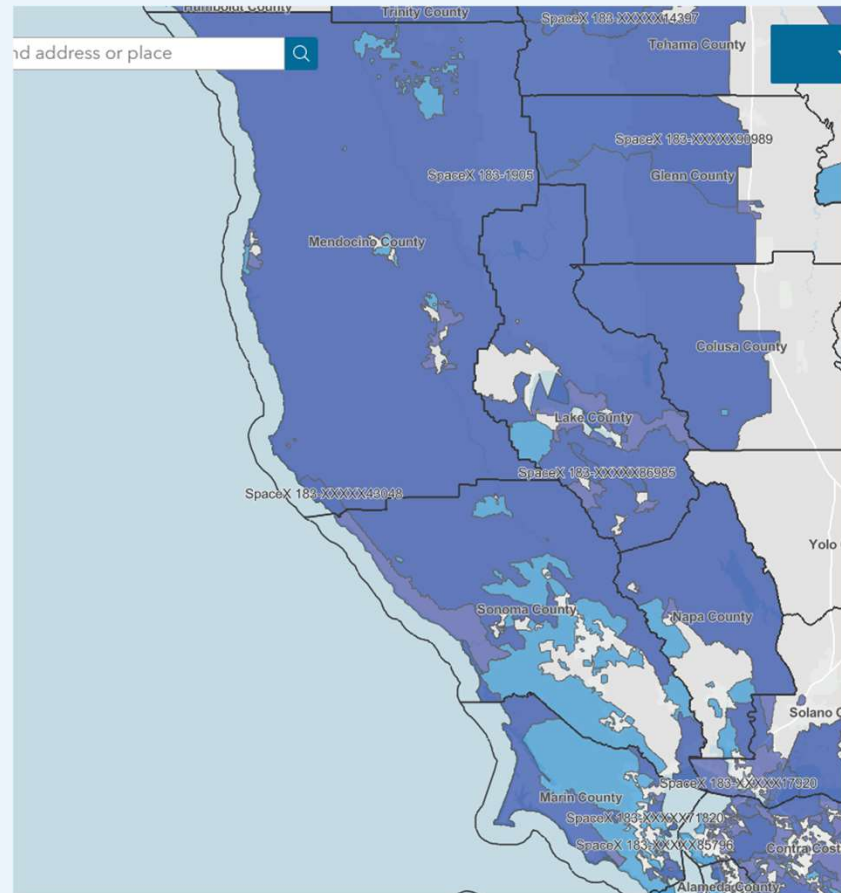


Preliminary BEAD Award Map – Fixed Wireless Projects

Other Deployment Grants

- WiConduit and Gigabit Now have been awarded CASF funding for three fiber optic projects in Sonoma County:
 - Forestville Connect Extension
 - Graton Connect
 - Sonoma Coast Connect Extension
- Awards total \$32,398,849
- Will connect 341 unserved locations (\$95,011 per location)



Other Deployment Grants

- Hankins Information Technology has been awarded CASF funding for the West Marin project in the communities of Point Reyes Station, Stinson, Bolinas and Nicasio.
- Awarded \$8,500,000.
- Will connect 154 unserved locations (\$55,195 per location)



Carrier of Last Resort

- AT&T has received authorization from the Federal Communications Commission to de-commission copper landlines in California
- AT&T is suing the CPUC claiming that federal regulations pre-empt state regulations
- CPUC seems confident that the lawsuit will fail
- AT&T had negotiated a plan with the CPUC but appears to have negotiated in bad faith
- Lack of trust that AT&T will not turn off landline service to rural customers without alternatives
